

Since beginning her career at Murray Ridge Center in the fall of 2016, teacher Samantha Shaw has taken cues from her class to design lessons that will help them grow and learn in their unique ways. When her students began demonstrating the need for emotional regulation, Samantha turned to something that had worked for her in the past: yoga and meditation.

When working in a previous teaching position at a high school, Samantha enlisted the help of a certified yoga instructor, Laura Srsa, to lead her class in a weekly yoga and meditation class. Once she started at Murray Ridge, she began using meditation as a way for the students and staff to enter a calm environment where they could bond emotionally with each other and reflect on their unique strengths and aifts.

her class to yoga. Because of her schedule, Laura was unable to attend weekly classes, so Samantha took over and began teaching her class based on the tools and structure she had learned throughout her years of practice.

The classes took off! In fact, they were so successful that Samantha opened them up to the rest of the Murray Ridge School primary classes, and many students and staff are now participating in the combination yoga/meditation classes on a weekly basis.

"Students feel safe discussina their emotions and are better able to communicate appropriately to peers," Samantha said. "Staff are able to use these tools as well in order to help maintain peace and kindness in the classroom. In one

instance, a student's mom said her child actually directed her to 'take a deep breath in and get control' when she was overwhelmed!"



All of the materials Samantha has received for her yoga/meditation class has come from Donor's Choose funding; LED color changing candles, chimes, finger drums, and quartz singing bowls are just some of the meditation tools that help students during the classes. Samantha hopes to eventually add new yoga mats and aromatherapy eye pillows for deeper relaxation.

Samantha could not be happier with how yoga and meditation have affected the students. "They demonstrate a kindness and bond that I have not observed prior to implementing this class," she said. "The staff demonstrates a sense of calm that allows us to provide the most gentle and compassionate approach possible."

Murray Ridge Center Far Exceeded its '50 Acts of Giving Back' Goal in 2017

At the beginning of 2017, to celebrate its fiftieth anniversary, Murray Ridge set out to complete at least "Fifty Acts of Giving Back" to the community that has supported its provision of lifelong services to thousands of local residents with developmental disabilities. This initiative, whereby members of the Murray Ridge Family would 'give back' through at least fifty acts of helping to meet needs in Lorain County, was wildly successful.

By the end of last year, 213 Acts of Giving Back had been completed, with more than 180 program participants volunteering their time at more than 40 locations in Lorain County throughout the year. While many of those individuals volunteered dozens of times, Rosa Ortiz (right), who attends the Elyria Opportunity/Vocational Center, led the effort with 31 separate volunteer acts!

Murray Ridge program closing information will be available on TV station Fox 8, on the Fox 8 website fox8.com, on radio stations WEOL 930 AM and WOBL 1320 AM, and on Murray Ridge Center's Facebook page. **There will be two separate listings for Murray Ridge Center:**

- Murray Ridge—Adult Activities Centers
- Murray Ridge School

There has been a change to how the information for our Adult Activities Centers is displayed by Fox 8 on its website and on television.

On fox8.com, the information is now under the 'Daycare' tab in the School Closings section.

On Channel 8, information about the status of our Adult Activities Centers will now scroll beneath the School Closings information at the very bottom of the television screen under 'Daycare', from left to right. These listings are in alphabetical order by county; however, no county names will be listed due to the limitations of Fox 8's computer systems. Therefore, you must continue to monitor that 'Daycare' listing, as you will have no indication which county is being listed at any given time.

You can also sign up to receive text alerts on Murray Ridge School and Adult Activities Centers closings. To do so, click the Closing Text Alerts under the School Closings section of the Fox 8 website.

Parents and caregivers of school students should disregard the "Murray Ridge—Adult Activities Centers" listing, and follow only the listing for "Murray Ridge School." Conversely, adult consumers who attend our Opportunity/Vocational Centers and their parents/caregivers should disregard the "Murray Ridge School" listing, and follow only the listing for "Murray Ridge—Adult Activities Centers."

If "Open—No Transportation" follows the announcement for "Murray Ridge—Adult Activities Centers," parents/caregivers are welcome to transport adult consumers to their day service sites. Regular programming will be provided. Consumers should be dropped off no earlier than 8:30 a.m. and must be picked up by 3:45 p.m.

In the event of bad weather, the decision to transport individuals to Murray Ridge Center will be based on the ability of our buses to travel safely on city and county roads. Regardless of whether or not transportation is

available through Murray Ridge Center, if our Opportunity/ Vocational Centers are open, but there is an individual concern about the weather, adult consumers should feel free to stay home. Likewise, parents/caregivers of Murray Ridge School students who have individual concerns regarding the weather should feel free to keep their child at home, even if school is in session.

Please be aware that transportation to enclave sites is generally available even if transportation to the Opportunity/ Vocational Centers is cancelled. Murray Ridge Center does not broadcast the status of enclave transportation on the television or radio. Consumers should assume that enclave transportation will be available unless they receive a phone call from a member of our Supported Employment Department.




BOARD ROOM BRIEFING The Lorain County Board of DD convened at 6:30 p.m. on January 29:

At the annual Organizational Meeting, held immediately prior to the regular meeting of the Board and Ethics Council, Board President Michelle Hunt announced the reappointment of Board members Kurt Koepf and Dan White; both had taken the Oath of Office in January, 2018. President Hunt also stepped down from her position, as her term with the Board has ended after 12 years. The Board elected the following officers for 2018: Kurt Koepf, President, Keith Boey, Vice-President, and Bob Gajdos, Secretary; newly elected President Koepf then made Board committee appointments for the year. The regular Board meeting began with a special recognition of out-going Board President Michelle Hunt, who served three consecutive terms from 2006-2018. The Board approved a resolution to provide educational services to children ages 6-21 in the 2018/2019 school year, and discussed the Murray Ridge School summer camp program for 2018. Director of Human Resources, Faira Corbett, reported on accomplishments related to the Agency's 2017 Risk Management Plan, and discussed the goals that have been established by the Risk Management Committee for 2018. Superintendent Fisher reported on 2018 activities, and the 2018 Board calendar was established.
