A Message From The Superintendent

2018 promises to be an important year for Murray Ridge Center and people with developmental disabilities within our community.

Last year marked the 50th

anniversary of county boards of developmental disabilities and, through our '50 Acts of Giving Back' initiative, many of those we serve volunteered to meet needs of others in Lorain County. This year-long project, which involved 213 separate events or 'acts' performed by more than 180 people with developmental disabilities, continued and formalized a spirit of generosity and goodwill that has long been exhibited by our program participants. Interested individuals who are served within our Adult Program will continue to 'give back' through volunteer work, and as members of service clubs that have been established at all three of our Opportunity/ Vocational Centers.

Workforce participation is another important way in which many people with developmental disabilities make valuable contributions locally. In recent years, our Service and Support Administrators have focused on assisting with the exploration of individual paths to community employment. In 2017, our Supported Employment Department provided community-based work opportunities for hundreds of adult program participants, and exceeded its strategic target relevant to facilitating new competitive job placements.

In the year ahead, finding creative and costeffective ways to assist and prepare those we serve to participate meaningfully in community life will continue to be a focus. This challenge will apply not only within our Service & Support Administration Department, and our Adult and Residential Programs, but also to our School Program. Helping infants and toddlers with or at risk for delays to maximize development and functionality within their natural environments will be the priority of our Early Intervention Department.

Another challenge of critical importance this year will be the passage of an issue to appear on the May 08 ballot: the renewal of a 1.6875 mills levy that will expire after December 31, 2018. This levy currently accounts for approximately one third of the Agency's revenue, and some of the funds that come from this levy are used to pull down federal dollars that can only be accessed if local match monies are used. Needless to say, continuation of the current levy funding is imperative for the provision of necessary support for Lorain County residents of all ages with developmental disabilities; this levy, if passed, will not increase taxes.

We will conclude this year with the preparation of a three-year (2019-2021) strategic plan for fulfilling our mission in the years ahead. We will always remember that our success is anchored in the support of our community; the daily dedication of our amazing staff; the outstanding collaboration with other local agencies and service providers; effective partnerships with families and other caregivers of those we serve; and the remarkable efforts and contributions of people with developmental disabilities. I wish all of you a very happy and successful year!

Second MRS Student Receives Amtryke Bike From North Ridgeville Kiwanis

On December 19, Mackenzie Dvorscak (right) became the second student at Murray Ridge School to receive an Amtryke therapeutic tricycle courtesy of the North Ridgeville Kiwanis Club through the Amtryke Project, which has the mission of helping children with disabilities become more active while having fun.

An Amtryke is a tricycle that is modified to meet the individual needs of children and adults with disabilities. As a child grows, the Amtryke can be modified. It is primarily used for therapy, but the tricycles also provide a sense of freedom and mobility.

Mackenzie was identified by Murray Ridge School staff as a student who would benefit from an Amtryke. Arrangements were made by Physical Therapist Renee Phillips to have the appropriate application forms submitted to the Kiwanis, and, once received, the bike was assembled by Kiwanis members Lee Fenrich, Gary Krone, Tony Baldassar, and Ed Bahl, and presented to Mackenzie.

In March 2017, Murray Ridge School first grader Lana Ayala was the first to receive an Amtryke therapeutic tricycle from the North Ridgeville Kiwanis. Lana was nominated by her Physical Therapist, Rebecca Farmer.

The Amtryke Project is in line with the mission of the North Ridgeville Kiwanis Club, which serves both the community and children through activities such as service projects, collecting children's shoes and socks for donations, and providing Christmas gifts to North Ridgeville Community Care for children in need. As the national Kiwanis motto states,

the club is committed to "helping to change the world, one child at a time."

Important Weather-Related Announcements

Murray Ridge program closing information will be available on TV station Fox 8, on the Fox 8 website fox8.com, on radio stations WEOL 930 AM and WOBL 1320 AM, and on Murray Ridge Center's Facebook page. **There will be two separate listings for Murray Ridge Center:**

- Murray Ridge—Adult Activities Centers
- Murray Ridge School

There has been a change to how the information for our Adult Activities Centers is displayed by Fox 8 on its website and on television.

On fox8.com, the information is now under the 'Daycare' tab in the School Closings section.

On Channel 8, information about the status of our Adult Activities Centers will now scroll beneath the School Closings information at the very bottom of the television screen under 'Daycare', from left to right. These listings are in alphabetical order by county; however, no county names will be listed due to the limitations of Fox 8's computer systems. Therefore, you must continue to monitor that 'Daycare' listing, as you will have no indication which county is being listed at any given time.

You can also sign up to receive text alerts on Murray Ridge School and Adult Activities Centers closings. To do so, click the Closing Text Alerts under the School Closings section of the Fox 8 website.

Parents and caregivers of school students should disregard the "Murray Ridge—Adult Activities Centers" listing, and follow only the listing for "Murray Ridge School." Conversely, adult consumers who attend our Opportunity/Vocational Centers and their parents/caregivers should disregard the "Murray Ridge School" listing, and follow only the listing for "Murray Ridge—Adult Activities Centers."

If "Open—No Transportation" follows the announcement for "Murray Ridge—Adult Activities Centers," parents/caregivers are welcome to transport adult consumers to their day service sites. Regular programming will be provided. Consumers should be dropped off no earlier than 8:30 a.m. and <u>must</u> be picked up by 3:45 p.m.

In the event of bad weather, the decision to transport individuals to Murray Ridge Center will be based on the ability of our buses to travel safely on city and county roads. Regardless of whether or not transportation is

available through Murray Ridge Center, if our Opportunity/ Vocational Centers are open, but there is an individual concern about the weather, adult consumers should feel free to stay home. Likewise, parents/caregivers of Murray Ridge School students who have individual concerns regarding the weather should feel free to keep their child at home, even if school is in session.

Please be aware that transportation to enclave sites is generally available even if transportation to the Opportunity/ Vocational Centers is cancelled. Murray Ridge Center does not broadcast the status of enclave transportation on the television or radio. Consumers should assume that enclave transportation will be available unless they receive a phone call from a member of our Supported Employment Department.

BOARD ROOM BRIEFING

The Lorain County Board of DD convened at 6:30 p.m. on December 18, 2017:

Board member Dan White shared that a staff member has been selected for next quarter's Exceptional Service Board Award; this award will be presented at an upcoming staff meeting. The Board unanimously approved an annual agreement with the Murray Ridge Production Center. Heather Gurchik, Director of Service and Support Administration, recommended and the Board approved increases to the cost ceiling for supported living services provided in Individual settings, and to the foster care per diem rates. Dr. Fisher updated the Board on the prospects for the sale of houses that were previously Board-operated group homes on East Ninth St. in Elyria and East College St. in Oberlin. The Board unanimously passed a resolution requesting a ballot issue for the renewal of its expiring 1.6875 mills levy; the revenue generated through this levy represents more than 30% of the Board's revenue and, if passed, the ballot issue will not cost the taxpayers anything additional.
