A Message From The Superintendent



... and a new decade ... we at Murray Ridge remain grateful for your support, and energized to tackle new challenges and work strategically to enhance opportunities for those we serve.

2020 will bring a significant number of new Medicaid waiver enrollments (with 65 new enrollments approved for the year), expanded availability of funds through our Family Support Services Program (see the December 2019 edition of the Courier), and numerous programmatic endeavors. Some areas of concentration in the year ahead will include: development of self-advocacy skills of local citizens with developmental disabilities, and more formal measurement of the effectiveness of associated supports; exploration and integration into person-centered plans of technologies that promote independence and quality of life; pursuit of additional accessible options for transportation to community destinations; and recruitment of a variety of service providers capable of addressing the diverse needs and desires of Lorain County residents with developmental disabilities.

Additionally, we plan to work collaboratively with other organizations on an initiative to promote access of infants and toddlers with developmental delays to formal intervention at the critically important ages of 0-3; and will continue to directly serve hundreds of children and families through our Early Intervention Program. Murray Ridge School, where enrollment in the School Age Program has grown steadily during the last decade, will remain an option for local students with significant disabilities, and an extraordinary

As we ring in a new year community resource. Meanwhile, support of the transition of Lorain County students with developmental disabilities into rewarding vocational activities will be a focus of our Service & Support Administration (SSA) Department.

> In 2019, continuing education as a postsecondary option for people with intellectual disabilities in Lorain County was supported through the establishment of a new program, 'Echoing U,' which is operated by Echoing Hills Inc. on the campus of Lorain County Community College; this program will continue into the future. We will continue to focus on expanding community-based employment of, and facilitating community participation by eligible adults. At our Opportunity & Vocational Centers (OVCs), we will continue to facilitate service clubs, and support 'acts of giving back' by those we serve; in 2019, 245 such acts were performed by 193 participants at the Murray Ridge OVCs. Hats off to local citizens with developmental disabilities for so enthusiastically helping others in need within our community!

> It is a pleasure and a privilege to serve such wonderful individuals, and to work with the incredible staff and partners of Murray Ridge. We deeply appreciate, also, the many providers and local businesses that work with and employ those we serve. Happy new year to all of you, and thank you for all you do to support the mission of Murray Ridge Center!

Weather-Related Announcements Reminder

Murray Ridge program closing information will be available on **TV station Fox 8**, on the **Fox 8 website** (fox8.com), and on radio stations WEOL 930 AM and WOBL 1320 AM, as it has in the past.

There will be two separate listings for Murray Ridge Center:

- Murray Ridge—Adult Activities Centers
- Murray Ridge School

REMINDER: In 2018, there was a change made as to how the information for our Adult Activities Centers is displayed by Fox 8 on its website and on television.

- On fox8.com, the information will be under the 'Daycare' tab in the School Closings section.
- **On Channel 8**, information about the status of our Adult Activities Centers will now scroll from left to right beneath the School Closings information at the very bottom of the television screen under 'Daycare.' These listings are in alphabetical order by county; however, no county names will be listed due to the limitations of Fox 8's computer systems. Therefore, if you choose to use the TV to determine the status of the Adult Centers, you must continue to monitor that 'Daycare' listing until it has run a complete cycle.

NOTE: You can also sign up with Fox 8 to receive text alerts on Murray Ridge School and Adult Activities Centers closings. To do so, click on 'Closing Text Alerts' in the School Closings section of the Fox 8 website.

Parents and caregivers of school students should disregard the "Murray Ridge—Adult Activities Centers" listing, and follow only the listing for "Murray Ridge School." Conversely, **adult consumers** who attend our Opportunity/Vocational Centers and their parents/caregivers should disregard the "Murray Ridge School" listing, and follow only the listing for "Murray Ridge—Adult Activities Centers."

If "Open - No Transportation" follows the announcement for "Murray Ridge—Adult Activities Centers," parents/caregivers are welcome to transport adult consumers to their day service sites. Regular programming will be provided. Consumers should be dropped off no earlier than 8:30 a.m. and <u>must</u> be picked up by 3:45 p.m.

In the event of bad weather, the decision to transport individuals to Murray Ridge Center will be based on the ability of our buses to travel safely on city and county roads. Regardless of whether or not transportation is available through Murray Ridge Center, if our Opportunity/Vocational Centers are open, but there is an individual concern about the weather, adult consumers should feel free to stay home. Likewise, parents/caregivers of Murray Ridge School students who have individual concerns regarding the weather should feel free to keep their child at home, even if school is in session.

Please be aware that **transportation to enclave sites** is generally available even if transportation to the Opportunity/Vocational Centers is cancelled. Murray Ridge Center does not broadcast the status of enclave transportation on the television or radio. Consumers should assume that enclave transportation will be available unless they receive a phone call from a member of our Supported Employment Department.

from an ICF to a small group setting. Michalena assisted Dorothy throughout the entire transition process and with finding her new home.



BOARD ROOM BRIEFING

The Lorain County Board of DD convened at 6:30 p.m. on December 16, 2019:

Superintendent Fisher and Director of Business Greg Westgate presented the 2020 employee health insurance rates under the County Health Plan, as well as an historical overview of health insurance costs. Board member Beverly Gedid reported on the Public Relations Committee meeting; a major project for 2020 will be enhancement of the Agency website. Board Member Dan White announced that a nominee had been selected for the next Exceptional Service Board Award, which will be presented at an upcoming staff meeting. The Board reviewed the cost ceilings for Supported Living services, and unanimously approved revisions to the Supported Living Program policy. The Board unanimously approved an annual agreement with the Murray Ridge Production Center. Board President Robert (Bob) Gajdos was presented with the 2019 Volunteer of the Year Award; his extraordinary support of the mission, consumers and staff of Murray Ridge Center are deeply appreciated.
