Drivers Needed




A PRESCHOOL OPTION

James has his own car, and being able to be safe and drive himself to the places he wants to go to is very important to him. James enjoys exploring his

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Murray Ridge Teacher, ChickQuest Program Spotlighted

Congratulations to Murray Ridge School Teacher Samantha Polczynski for having her work teaching the popular ChickQuest program recognized in a lengthy feature story on the website of GrowNextGen – a statewide organization funded by the Ohio Soybean Council and Ohio soybean farmers that provides teachers with free, high-quality STEM units and lessons focused on agriculture. From monitoring living eggs to observing fluffy chicks, ChickQuest's lively activities pique curiosity, encourage collaboration and commu-nication, and provide young scientists with unforgettable experiences. "Ms. Sam" would like to thank GrowNextGen and the Ohio Soybean Council for supplying the training and more than \$400 in materials, and she would also like to thank Sally Hennessy from the Ohio State University Extension Office for her support.

Polczynski was trained in a ChickQuest workshop in 2019. According to Polczynski, "My classroom had been learning about the life cycle and had opportunities to watch caterpillars transform into butterflies. I wanted to purchase tadpoles and watch them grow into frogs, but could not get the timing right with school curriculum and weather conditions. In my search for other options, I stumbled upon ChickQuest. It sounded like a much more involved program and would be a new challenge for me and my students. I decided to attend the training, and it was enlightening. I learned so much myself! Our team won the egg catcher challenge and I was blown away with the supplies we received following class.

"ChickQuest provides so many engaging activities and scientific hands-on learning. It also requires serious conversations about the life cycle, following direc-

tions, and being mindful of safety. Throughout the fun experiments, the students



are listening and learning about scientific procedures and risks involved with our experiment. We have discussed the importance of numbering (not naming) the eggs and understanding that it is unlikely all eggs will hatch.

"My students do best with learning that involves hands-on problem solving and sensory-based experiences. If it's a mess, it's a success! In past lessons, students have particularly been interested in learning about the parts of the egg and that the egg yolk and albumen is NOT the undeveloped chick. Testing the strength of the eggs is an activity that always surprises! The students were incredibly engaged in the material and eagerly welcomed 6 out of 10 chicks, all which were placed at a local farm.

"This will be my second time teaching with the modified materials using Zoom. This year, we plan to record the lessons and post them on YouTube for easy access. I am coordinating with Angel Escobar, a teacher in Cleveland City School District, to pro-

vide sign language interpretation for the videos.

"Transitioning to remote learning was an initial challenge, as our students need and greatly benefit from direct instruction. Using the technology resources available, I took advantage of Zoom and was forced to think outside of a new box. Based on our ability to successfully utilize technology and navigate the new world of remote learning, I

have remained as a designated remote teacher during the 20/21 school year, teaching students who opted for continued remote learning education.

"Like many teachers, I was fearful of how COVID would impact my students and their families and my ability to meet the educational needs of my students. Our classroom is built on 'rising to the challenge' and it was my turn to demonstrate that as the classroom leader. COVID did not stop our class. If anything, it has highlighted our ability to adapt, modify, and problem solve. I have seen my students grow in unexpected ways that may not have occurred without the sudden change we have all experienced."

A Message on Vaccine Hesitancy From the Cleveland Clinic

Vaccination is a crucial step in putting this pandemic behind us, but only if enough people receive the vaccine. Addressing vaccine hesitancy is a challenge we need to face to reach herd immunity.

It's been more than a year since we first learned about COVID-19. No one could have predicted how the virus would impact our lives and the world as we knew it. There is certainly a reason to be hopeful with the development, authorization and increased availability of safe vaccines, but only if enough people get vaccinated.

In order for us to reach herd immunity, 70% to 85% of the population will need to be vaccinated first. Addressing vaccine misinformation and uncertainty is now a hurdle we'll need to clear before the pandemic can officially end.

Addressing vaccine hesitancy

Given the speed of the development of these COVID-19 vaccines, it's understandable that you have questions about whether or not there's been enough research to ensure that they are safe.

Please be assured that all of the vaccines went through rigorous clinical trials to determine safety and effectiveness, including patient follow-up and approval from the FDA. Independent panels of vaccine experts have also closely scrutinized the data from those trials and deemed the vaccines to be safe and effective for emergency use. Similar independent panels in several other countries are in agreement.

If you look at the number of cases where a large part of the population has already been vaccinated, you will see how beneficial and lifesaving the vaccines are. Getting vaccinated helps protect you and those around you, including those who are most at risk and those who can't be vaccinated (or haven't been eligible yet, like children).

If you have more questions about the vaccine, talk with your

trusted healthcare provider or look to reliable sources like the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention or the World Health Organization.

After you are vaccinated, please follow basic safety precautions like masking, distancing and hand washing. Doing so will help protect those around you who haven't been vaccinated yet.

Thank you for choosing hope

Many of you have already received the vaccine and in doing so, are helping to control the pandemic. We encourage you to share your vaccination experience with friends and family. Doing so may ease someone else's worries or fears about it.

BOARD ROOM BRIEFING

The Lorain County Board of DD convened at 6:30 p.m. on April 26, 2021

The Board passed multiple resolutions related to Murray Ridge Adult Services (MRAS); these decisions were necessary because the federal Medicaid agency (CMS) will not allow county boards to provide Medicaid-funded direct services (like Adult Services) to Medicaid waiver recipients after March of 2024, and the Ohio Department of Developmental Disabilities has taken the position that this year the Lorain County Board of DD must significantly reduce the number of waiver recipients to whom it directly provides Adult Services. Individuals currently impacted by the decisions related to MRAS have been contacted. As of May 01, 2021, those who are newly enrolled on Medicaid waivers will not be able to (continue to) receive MRAS, upon waiver enrollment. Parts of the Elyria Opportunity & Vocational Center will be leased to private providers of Adult Day Support/Vocational Habilitation. Agency calendars for 07/01/2021 – 06/30/2022 were approved. The Board also approved a sponsorship of the upcoming Synergy Conference, to occur on October 6-7, 2021.
