Dr. Payner, who retired in 2004, led the Murray Ridge Center for nearly twenty-seven years, having started as superintendent in 1977. She was here in the early years of county boards of developmental disabilities, and both witnessed and oversaw many progressive changes to services for people with developmental disabilities.

It is truly not possible, in anything less a novel, to cover her contributions or do justice to the memory of Dr. Payner. Her dedication and presence were enormous, and she would tell you that she looked forward to getting to work each and every day. Godspeed Ellen (Dr. Payner). You will forever figure largely in our hearts and our history.



Contact tracing call? 5 things to know

A contact tracer from your state health department might call if you've been exposed to COVID-19. But scammers are pretending to be contact tracers, too. Here's how you can spot the scam.



Real contact tracers won't ask you for money.

Only scammers insist on payment by gift card, money transfer, or cryptocurrency.



Contact tracing doesn't require your bank account or credit card number.

Never share account information with anybody who contacts you asking for it.



Legitimate contact tracers will never ask for your Social Security number.

Never give any part of your Social Security number to anyone who contacts you.



Your immigration status doesn't matter for contact tracing, so real tracers won't ask.

If they do, you can bet it's a scam.



Do not click on a link in a text or email.

Doing so can download malware onto your device.

Talking to a real contact tracer helps stop the spread of COVID-19. Reporting scammers helps stop them, too. Report fake contact tracers to your state and at **ftc.gov/complaint**.

Paul helps Robert with the development of his Individual Service Plan (ISP) which lists the services and supports that assist Robert with living his life the way he wants. Paul also monitors his services and keeps his plan up-to-date as Robert's life goals and interests change. Recently, Paul helped Robert with getting a bathroom modification completed in his home so he could be more independent with his daily personal care!

Robert lives with two roommates in a small group setting in Lorain. Robert receives supports in his home from **REM Ohio**. REM Ohio is an agency that supports people to do daily life tasks such as personal care, household cleaning, cooking, shopping, scheduling medical appointments, paying bills, and taking medications. REM Ohio staff help Robert with his self-care, with cooking his meals, with taking

his medications, with getting in and out of his wheelchair, and with a variety of other tasks on a daily basis. While at home Robert enjoys watching his favorite TV shows like "Property Brothers," playing baseball games on his tablet or his Game Cube, listening to country music, and watching the Cleveland Browns. This year, Robert got a bird feeder and also some plants for his porch that he has enjoyed taking care of! Robert takes a lot of pride in being able to do things on his own

Murray Ridge to Operate a Point of Distribution In the Case of Certain Emergencies

In the event of a county-wide health emergency requiring the distribution of medicine or treatment, Murray Ridge Center, in conjunction with Lorain County Public Health, will operate a temporary Point of Distribution (POD) to provide medicine or treatments to consumers (people with developmental disabilities who have been determined eligible for services from the Lorain County Board of Developmental Disabilities), and their immediate caregivers.

Family members who live in households with children and adults with developmental disabilities will be eligible to receive medication/treatment from the Murray Ridge Center closed POD. Caregivers assigned at the time of POD operation to work with individuals with developmental disabilities who do not live with family will also be eligible to receive medicine/treatment from the Murray Ridge Center POD for themselves and members of their immediate households.


Should the need to operate a Murray Ridge Center POD occur, specifics will be communicated on the Murray Ridge Center Facebook page, on our website, and/or through other local media and other communications.
