A Message from the Superintendent



Greetings to all service recipients, families, staff, and other partners and friends of Murray Ridge! 2018 was certainly a busy and successful year at Murray Ridge Center. Among our

accomplishments were the passage of a renewal levy that went into effect on 01/01/2019, thereby ensuring the continued availability of critically important funds to support eligible individuals; the receipt of a threeyear Department of Developmental Disabilities accreditation, the highest accreditation award available; and the development of a three-year (2019 -2021) strategic plan. Our work in 2018 has set us on a good course for 2019 and the years ahead.

In keeping with Ohio's Employment First Initiative, assisting eligible individuals of working age to secure and retain community employment will continue to be a priority in 2019. Examination of transportation issues as they relate to community employment will be an area of focus this year. Additionally, our Service & Support Administration (SSA) Department will focus on enhancement of assessment and service planning related to assisting individuals to advance on their paths to community employment.

Expansion of supports that enable eligible individuals to experience community life will be an important goal in 2019. To this end, both our SSA Department and Murray Ridge Adult Services will implement a number of related strategies included in our threeyear plan, while the staff of Murray Ridge School and the Meister Home continue to pursue communitybased opportunities for our students and group home residents. Additionally, interested Adult Program participants will continue to be involved with service clubs at all three of our Opportunity & Vocational Centers and, through our Acts of Giving Back Program, to volunteer in many capacities to help those in need within our community.

In the year ahead, we will also focus on exploration of new ways to address identified, unmet needs and desires of those we serve through provider recruitment, community resources, and financial assistance. We will continue and expand the provision of informational sessions on topics of interest to people with developmental disabilities, their family members, and others who care for and support them. Self-advocacy, assistive technology, and transition of youth into jobs and adult services are just a few of the topics that will be covered. We invite <u>you</u> to let us know of topics of interest.

Our goal is to continue, enhance and, as feasible, expand the supports available to local children and adults with developmental disabilities. To this end, we look forward to collaboration with community businesses and partners, service providers and other caregivers of people with developmental disabilities, our amazing Murray Ridge staff, and the wonderful individuals who we are privileged to serve. You are all deeply appreciated!
