

# A Brief Look at the History of Developmental Disabilities...



A Sad Look Back...

For decades, many people with developmental disabilities were placed in large, segregated facilities across the country, away from society and their families. One such facility, the Cleveland Developmental Center\* (right), was demolished in 1977.

For much of American history, many people with developmental disabilities were cloistered away from society into large - and often inhumane - institutional care facilities, where little, if any, attention was given to their education, health, or personal development. During the '60s and '70s, however, in what is now known as the Family Movement, the loved ones of people with developmental disabilities began to push back against these dehumanizing institutions and demand more inclusive, compassionate programs, services, and resources. Today, agencies like Murray Ridge Center have been founded to take the place of these segregated institutions by coordinating services and support for people with developmental disabilities and placing a focus on independence, growth, and community engagement. # CONSUMER PROFILE: MEET KELLY MCMILLAN

Kelly McMillan is an adventurous, happy-go-lucky person who loves participating in all kinds of activities. Kelly is supported by her Murray Ridge Service and Support Administrator (SSA), Sandy Desai, who assists Kelly in utilizing her I.O. (Individual Options) waiver and developing her Individual Service Plan (ISP). Kelly's ISP lists the services and supports that she has decided will work best for her, and she works with Sandy to keep her ISP up to date as her goals evolve and change.

Kelly lives with two roommates in a small group setting in Lorain, where she receives supports from **Our Lady of the Wayside (OLW)**. OLW is an agency that supports people with daily life tasks such as taking care of personal needs, doing household chores, cooking meals, shopping, scheduling medical appointments, paying bills, and taking medications.





Kelly is happiest when she is out in the community. She loves going to Cedar Point, attending Lake Erie Crushers games, picnicking in the park, shopping, eating out, and hiking. At the end of each day, she enjoys counting how many steps she's taken with her FitBit.

Kelly is very close to her family, especially her mother, whom Kelly spends time with on the weekends and relies on for support and guidance. They both volunteer together at the local APL and food pantry, and they love taking mother-daughter trips to Put-In-Bay.

During the week, Kelly spends her time at **Pathways**, an adult day program run by Our Lady of the Wayside. According to their website, "Our Lady of the Wayside's Pathways Program offers day services for more than 250 adults with de-

velopmental disabilities and focuses on personal growth for participants through a variety of activities. Pathways has served the community for over nine years." Originally established in Westlake, Ohio, Pathways now operates five locations in Avon, Westlake, Mentor, Valley View and Garfield Heights.

OLW's vision is to "empower individuals to exercise their right to meaningful, productive lives by creating opportunities to achieve that shared reality." Just a few months ago, Kelly began attending Pathways, where she has been taking cooking classes, making arts and crafts, and learning computer skills. She also loves all of the community activities like shopping, going to museums, visiting parks, and attending baseball games. Kelly looks forward to going everyday to see her friends and staff.





In past years, Kelly has used her I.O. waiver to attend summer camps, but she was unable to do so this year due to the pandemic. This summer, she chose to go to Mohican State Park with one of her OLW staff instead. She got to stay in a cabin and had a great time exploring all of the hiking trails the park had to offer.

## **Boardroom Briefing**

The Lorain County Board of DD convened at 6:30 p.m. on August 30, 2021

Board member Cathie Leimbach, Board liaison to the Murray Ridge Housing Corporation (MRHC), provided an update on MRHC activities. The Board unanimously approved a revision to the Management & Confidential policy on Tuition Reimbursement. Superintendent Amber Fisher provided an update on transitions within the Murray Ridge Adult Services (MRAS) Program. The Board passed a resolution that individuals who were notified that they would no longer be able to receive MRAS after August 31, 2021, would be able to receive Virtual Adult Day Services (VADS) from MRAS after August 31, if they were not receiving in-person Adult Services from another provider. Jeff Miller, Director of Vocational & Transportation Services, presented the Board with a proposed listing of Murray Ridge School bus stops, along with estimated pick-up and drop-off times; the Board unanimously adopted the listing, and authorized the superintendent or her designee to relocate or designate additional bus stops during the school year.

## **Annual Transportation Safety Instructions**

Murray Ridge Center wants you to be safe when travelling. These are guidelines that students, eligible adults, and their caregivers should be aware of when utilizing transportation services.

#### WAITING FOR THE BUS

- Wait for the bus at least 10 feet from the road.
- Dress properly winter clothing, hats, mittens, and boots will help keep you warm in the winter.
- · Watch for the bus' red lights.
- Wait until the bus has stopped and door opens before stepping into the roadway.
- Wait for the driver to signal to cross.

  Cross at least 10 feet in front of the bus.
- Use the handrail when stepping onto the
  hus.
- If you use a wheelchair, it must be equipped with a functioning seat belt. The wheels should lock as well.
- Store all belongings in a backpack so nothing gets dropped.

#### **BUS SEAT SAFETY RULES**

- Follow all of the driver's instructions.
- Speak softly so the driver will not be distracted. At railroad crossings, be quiet.
- Stay seated until your stop and keep the aisle clear.
- Never put head, arms, or hands out of the window.
- Never do anything to distract the driver.
- Keep aisles clear and free of tripping hazards.
- Never throw things on the bus or out the windows.
- Tell the driver or monitor if you are being bullied.
- If there is an emergency, listen to the driver and follow instructions.
- Do not eat on the bus, as this could present a choking hazard.
- Store all belongings in a backpack so nothing gets dropped.

#### GETTING OFF THE BUS AT HOME

- If you have to cross the street in front of the bus, walk at least ten feet ahead of the bus along the side of the road, until you can turn around and see the driver.
- Make sure that the driver can see you.
- Wait for the signal from the driver before beginning to cross.
- When the driver signals, walk across the road, keeping an eye out for sudden traffic changes.
- Do not cross the center line of the road until the driver has signalled that it is safe for you to begin walking.
- Stay away from the bus' rear wheels at all times. If you drop something near the bus, leave it. If you leave something on the bus, never return to get it. The driver may not see you come back and start to move the bus. If you drop something near the bus, tell the bus driver before you pick it up so he/ she knows where you are.

#### **PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION GENERAL SAFETY TIPS**

- When you enter or leave a vehicle, watch for slippery or uneven pavement and other hazards that could cause you to fall.
- Have your LCT ID, bus fare, ticket, or pass ready so you don't lose your balance while looking for it.
- Do not carry too many packages always leave a free hand to grab a railing.
- Allow extra time to cross streets, especially in bad weather.
- . If it's dark outside, wear light-colored or reflective clothing.
- Do not talk to strangers. If you are being bothered by someone, tell the driver immediately.
- If you use a stop assistance card, remember to show it to the driver as you board the bus.
- . Most LCT stops are not sheltered. Dress appropriately for the winter weather, and utilize sunscreen in the summer.
- Whether you are in a bus, car, or van ALWAYS WEAR YOUR SEATBELT IF THE VEHICLE IS EQUIPPED WITH ONE!
