

## Consumers Express Themselves Through Art

For centuries visual artists have poured their energies into drawings, paintings, sculptures and a variety of other creative mediums to express their emotions and to interpret the world around them. Some of these artists have found great acclaim from their works, while others perhaps simply found a meaningful outlet in which to express themselves. The latter is precisely what staff at the Lorain Work/Activity Center (LWAC) encourage adult consumers to do.

Sixty-seven-year-old consumer Eileen Frances has limited mobility and use of her arms, as well as limited verbal communication capability. For her, painting provides a method for self-expression, as well as an opportunity to engage in something physical that she enjoys.

Workshop Aide **Diana Markwood**, found a creative way for Frances to participate in something she has enjoyed since childhood, but found increasingly difficult to do as the years passed. Explains Markwood, "I assist Eileen by

providing her with a glove that has a paintbrush attached to it. She is then able to dip her brush into bowls of paint and then move the brush back and forth on the paper until she is ready for a different color. She will continue to do this with each work until she's happy with the way it looks," says Markwood.

Frances uses an Alternative Communication Device that is programmed with statements chosen by her with help from the speech therapist. With this device she is able to communicate short sentences by clicking on an icon. She chooses certain icons to talk about her art. "I like painting because I never know

what it's going to be when I'm done!" She smiles and adds "My first picture is called 'A Cat in the Wind.'"

Utilizing her device, Frances goes on to talk about her childhood, family and the people now in her life. "I am happy because Diana helps me to paint. She is a special person to me," she says.

Another individual who has enjoyed expressing himself through artistic endeavors is 20-year-old **Tony Harris**. Harris began receiving vocational training at LWAC nearly a year ago after graduating from Admiral King High School in Lorain.


We are proud of the Lady Raiders for such an impressive season and look forward to seeing what they do in future seasons!

## BOARD ROOM BRIEFING

### The Lorain County Board of DD convened at 12:30 p.m. on March 25, 2011:

Tim Donohue, Director of Communications, presented a new logo option for Board consideration. Following this, Board President Michelle L. Hunt asked the Board to approve a resolution of appreciation to local radio stations WOBL and WEOL. The Board approved unanimously. Jeff Miller, Director of Vocational and Transportation Services, reported on the Board Transportation Subcommittee meeting of March 24, 2011. Mr. Miller said there will be a customer satisfaction survey done for those consumers receiving adult services through the Board. Superintendent Amber Fisher then recommended no change to the current charge of \$7,500 per student to the local school districts for preschool services in the upcoming school year. The Board unanimously approved this recommendation. Superintendent Fisher further recommended that for typically-developing preschoolers in the program, the Board continue to charge \$5.00 per day per student. It was also suggested that the additional charge of \$7.50 per day if agency transportation services are accessed be retained for typically-developing preschoolers, that charges continue to be billed in quarterly installments, payable in advance, and that there be a pro-rated reimbursement should a student disenroll. The Board unanimously approved these recommendations. Dr. Fisher then updated the Board on the recently released Governor's biennial budget, stating that it includes a 7.6% cut in funding to the Ohio Department of Developmental Disabilities; the cuts will be passed onto County Boards of DD, which will result in an estimated reduction of 45% to the agency's state subsidy. Additionally, Dr. Fisher informed the Board that it has been made clear that the intent is to eliminate the GRF dollars being used to hold county boards harmless for the loss of the Tangible Personal Property Tax revenue; this will result in a loss of \$1.6 million per year to the agency. There is also a proposal to change the rate at which the TPPT hold harmless will be phased out, depending on how reliant agencies are on it. Finally, Dr. Fisher informed the Board that the Help Me Grow funding currently received by the agency has been cut by more than \$4,700 for this year. In other business, Al Sprague, Director of Residential Service and Support Administration, updated the Board on the quarterly Family Support allocation, and the Board unanimously approved the requested Second Quarter budget. Following this, the Board unanimously approved the Governing Rules and Regulations that are reviewed annually. The Board also unanimously approved revisions to the Ethics Council, Powers and Duties and Retention of Board Records policies. Director of Business John Bonko notified the Board of the intent to change the Inventory threshold from \$50 to \$250.
