Couple Brings Language to Life

Recently, Murray Ridge Language Development Specialist **Kathy Beatty** and her colleague and husband, Occupational Therapist **Chris Beatty**, were asked to present their methods for teaching communication at the 2010 ASHA national conference in Las Vegas, NV. A 135,000 member organization for speech and language professionals, ASHA's mission is to make effective communication accessible for all. But with so many members whose work focuses on effective communication, what is it that makes this duo stand out? The answer is two-fold.

First, this couple, who met in college, truly works as a team. "We decided a long time ago that we were going to find a way to work together. We were both passionate about helping people, so we had to find a way to blend Chris' knowledge of science and technology with my skills in language and communication. We are definitely a team. Because we love what we do and are also married, we never leave our work at work. We live it," said Kathy. As the couple explains, Chris is the expert when it comes to making the actual devices accessible to the students. For example, if a student can only move his or her head, then Chris creates a device that enables the student to use his or her head to pick the words on the AAC device screen. For kids with limited muscle control or other physical disabilities, this is crucial. Kathy helps the students to learn and use the words that enable them to best express themselves. Without either of their contributions, the students would have a far more difficult time communicating effectively.

In addition to their tireless team efforts and complimentary skills, there is also the unique program they've developed to teach and encourage Murray Ridge students to communicate. Their program, titled "Having Some Fun: Social Groups that Promote Communication Among AAC Users," focuses on fun and real-life peer interactions as a motivation for utilizing Augmentative and Alternative Communication, or AAC, devices. This method was born out of the work they do with small groups of same-gender peer students. In these groups Chris and Kathy strive to teach and encourage their nonverbal students not only to use their AAC devices, but also to learn and love the art of communication by encouraging the students to choose conversation topics and their "own words" for their meetings.

"Typically, when the devices are being used in a classroom or formal setting, the students are using them to answer questions or to relay information about topics that, while important, aren't necessarily interesting to them. If they aren't interested in what is being discussed, they aren't as moti-

vated to participate," said Kathy. She further explains that even the language that is used in a formal setting differs from what is used in a social setting and that the students are much more enthusiastic about communicating if they are using more casual words.

"Chris and I wanted to get the kids excited about using their devices—about *communicating*," said Kathy. Thus, the boys' and girls' groups are designed for the members to talk about real life topics of interest and the devices are programmed so that the kids get to choose the sound of their "voice" and the words they wish to use. With Kathy's guidance, a topic is chosen for the next meeting. The students then have two weeks to consider the words they wish to have accessible to them for that discussion. These words are then programmed into their AACs and on the day of the meeting, they are encouraged to take the lead in the discussion, rather than have staff lead the discussion. "The whole interaction is spontaneous and

fun and so much more natural. With these linguistic accommodations, they talk to each other the way real peers talk to each other. The vocabulary is more natural and they don't necessarily wait their turn to talk. Just like a real conversation," said Kathy. She explains that the kids are having a lot of fun and are enthusiastic about using their AAC devices. "They talk because they want to, not just because it's an academic exercise," said Kathy.

As evidenced in a video of a peer group in action, it seems clear from the faces of the students that the Beattys' method is effective, as the youngsters actively utilize their AAC devices without prompting. That alone would certainly make an interesting and important educational presentation to other communication professionals. But perhaps more compelling is the obvious enjoyment the students seem to be getting out of their interactions with peers. The smiles and laughs speak volumes about their enjoyment of communicating with one another.

We may say of the "Beatty team" that they have "the gift of gab," "a way with words," or are masters in "the art of communication." However you put it, there is no doubt that the method they use to enable Murray Ridge students to communicate with one another spells "success" in any language.





Important Weather-Related Announcements

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Murray Ridge program closing information will be available on TV station Fox 8, on the Fox 8 website fox8.com, and on radio stations WEOL 930 AM and WOBL 1320 AM, as it has in the past. However, rather than the listing "Lorain County Board of MR/DD," there will be two separate listings for Murray Ridge Center:

- Murray Ridge—Adult Activities Centers
- Murray Ridge School

Parents and caregivers of school students should disregard the "Murray Ridge—Adult Activities Centers" listing, and follow only the listing for "Murray Ridge School." Conversely, adult consumers and their parents/caregivers should disregard the "Murray Ridge School" listing, and follow only the listing for "Murray Ridge—Adult Activities Centers." Staff outside of the School, Residential, and Adult programs should report to work unless Murray Ridge School and Adult Activities Centers are listed as "Closed."

If "Open—No Transportation" follows the announcement for "Murray Ridge—Adult Activities Centers," parents/caregivers are welcome to transport adult consumers to their day service sites. Regular programming will be provided. Consumers should be dropped off no earlier than 8:30 a.m. and <u>must</u> be picked up by 3:45 p.m.

In the event of bad weather, the decision to transport individuals to Murray Ridge Center will be based primarily on the ability of our busses to travel safely on city and county roads. Regardless of whether or not transportation is available through Murray Ridge Center, if our Adult Activities Centers are open, but there is an individual concern about the weather, adult consumers should feel free to stay home. Likewise, parents/caregivers of Murray Ridge School students who have individual concerns regarding the weather should feel free to keep their child at home.

Please be aware that transportation to enclave sites is generally available even if transportation to the Adult Activities Centers is cancelled. Murray Ridge Center does not broadcast the status of enclave trans-

BOARD ROOM BRIEFING

The Lorain County Board of DD convened at 12:30 p.m. on November 20, 2009:

Superintendent Fisher informed the Board that the renewal of the agency's health insurance plan for 2010 amounted to a 7.58% increase in cost, which is lower than previously projected. The Board unanimously approved the renewal. Board member Henry Patterson announced that an additional Special Olympics basketball team will be added due to increased interest. He further noted that there were 180 active Murray Ridge athletes, and that the duplicated number of participants on all of the various Murray Ridge Special Olympics teams in 2009 was 360. In other business, the Board unanimously approved the 2010 operating budget. The Board also unanimously voted for Murray Ridge Delegate, Board President Michelle Hunt, to vote "yes" on all four resolutions being presented at the Ohio Association of County Boards of DD annual meeting on December 2. Additionally, the Board unanimously approved the renewal of its annual agreement with the Prosecutor's office for representation, as well as two changes to the agency's Holiday and Holiday Pay policy. Finally, Director of Educational Services Dann Swift reported that currently Murray Ridge Preschool has up to three units of funding available to it from the Ohio Department of Education (ODE). Mr. Swift stated further that ODE has agreed to continue to set aside funds for three units during a transitional year for the Preschool.
