Consumer Spotlight: Bill and Mark Lacko

They say it takes a village to raise a child.

But what happens when there are two children, both born with a rare genetic disorder, and a village not quite prepared to handle the enormity of support those children and their family needs?

Both boys attended Elyria High School because of its exceptional program for kids with special needs. This, however, did not stop Keystone High School (the home district) from rallying around the boys, and – as

For the city of LaGrange, neither of those issues proved to be a setback in the raising of Bill and Mark Lacko.

Randy Lacko, father to Bill and Mark, grew up in LaGrange, and he and his wife, Elaine, settled into the community where friends and family still remained. In 1975, Elaine gave birth to her first son, Bill. Five years later, she had Mark.

When pregnant with their third and final child, Sherry, Elaine and Randy began noticing delays with Bill. He was eventually diagnosed with Fragile X Syndrome, a genetic disorder associated with mental retardation and similar to autism. Mark, five years younger, was tested and also diagnosed with the condition.

"When Bill was diagnosed, it was a very rare thing. There were no organizations to be part of, no school that was familiar with their level of needs," said their mother, Elaine. "We were ignorant. We didn't realize there was anything out there for little ones."

This did not faze residents of LaGrange, and support came from many community organizations, in

Sherry and her mother pointed out – Bill had more pictures in the Keystone yearbook than his sister! That's not surprising, given Bill's affiliation with the school still today; he helps coach the wrestling team and is on the sidelines at every football game!

"The community rallies around them," said Sherry, their younger sister. "My family always pushed them to be involved in the community and community events. Now, it's amazing how many people in LaGrange know them!"

As adults, both Bill and Mark began attending Murray Ridge Center, where they found opportunities for the social interactions they had grown accustomed to in school. At the Elyria Opportunity/ Vocational Center, or EOVC as it's known at Murray Ridge, they have the opportunity to engage in activities that coincide with their personalities. Bill has become involved with Special Olympics; Mark is very active in the Community Employment Department. Both feel that these activities allow them to be just like everyone else.

"I have fun here," Bill said. "I like to go to work every day," added Mark. "I like having a job."

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And the family involvement with Murray Ridge doesn't end there. Sherry Lacko has found that being a sibling to brothers with a developmental disability has helped her choose a career path as a Behavioral Analyst with the Service and Support Administration department at Murray Ridge Center, where she visits family homes and day programs to work with consumers and develop behavior support plans based on functional and behavioral assessments. She noted that her brothers are the sole reason she chose to work with this population.

"Once I got older, I recognized the struggles they were going through," said Sherry. "I realized they couldn't be advocates for themselves, so I became an advocate for them."

"But, we've never not tried something," mom Elaine adds. "They have to prove to us that they <u>can't</u> do it." This family attitude has shaped Bill and Mark into the individuals they have grown up to be; social, outgoing, and lively members of a community that not only supports these men and their families, but has had a big hand in helping to raise them.

And, through their years in Lorain County, they've received invaluable support from the city of LaGrange, from the Elyria school system, and from Murray Ridge Center; support appreciated by the entire Lacko family, with Elaine noting, "It took the whole community to raise these boys to where they are today."

BOARD ROOM BRIEFING

The Lorain County Board of DD convened at 12:30 p.m. on November 16, 2012:

The Board presented Karen Pavelschak, a Recreation/Leisure Specialist from the Lorain Opportunity/Vocational Center, with an Exceptional Service Award. A renewal of prescription, vision, and medical insurance coverage with Medical Mutual (MMO) was approved with modified coverage in order to contain costs. Board member Dan White provided an update on Murray Ridge Special Olympics programs. An updated set of financial projections was presented, and the 2013 budget was approved, as submitted. Additional Level 1 Waiver enrollments were discontinued (topic to be revisited next summer). In other news, resolutions submitted for consideration at the upcoming OACB delegate assembly were discussed; no objections were noted by the Board. The Inland Trail Marathon generated approximately \$7,500 for the levy committee. Many thanks to all who volunteered to make this event a success.

The evening's keynote speakers were Natalie Winkelfoos and Ray Appenheimer, both from Oberlin College.

Natalie is the Associate Director of Athletics for Development and Alumni Affairs for the College. Her inspirational speech touched on her years as an athlete and how playing sports has impacted her life and career. She concluded her speech with a personal comment on her experience parenting a child with developmental disabilities, and noted how each person in the room was her hero, and made her proud to raise a son who might one day be as amazing as the Murray Ridge athletes.

Ray is the Head Track and Field/Cross Country Coach at Oberlin College. He, too, spoke of his experiences in sports, and noted how real athletes continue to get back on the court, despite any setbacks or losses they might experience. He ended his speech by calling Special Olympics "remarkable," and noted that professional athletes could take cue from the Murray Ridge competitors, who continue to play and strive for excellence, regardless of any failures they may encounter.

Parents and caregivers of school students should disregard the "Murray Ridge—Adult Activities Centers" listing, and follow only the listing for "Murray Ridge School." Conversely, adult consumers who attend our Opportunity/Vocational Centers and their parents/caregivers should disregard the "Murray Ridge School" listing, and follow only the listing for "Murray Ridge—Adult Activities Centers."

If "Open—No Transportation" follows the announcement for "Murray Ridge—Adult Activities Centers," parents/caregivers are welcome to transport adult consumers to their day service sites. Regular programming will be provided. Consumers should be dropped off no earlier than 8:30 a.m. and <u>must</u> be picked up by 3:45 p.m.

In the event of bad weather, the decision to transport individuals to Murray Ridge Center will be based on the ability of our busses to travel safely on city and county roads. Regardless of whether or not transportation is available through Murray Ridge Center, if our Opportunity/Vocational Centers are open, but there is an individual concern about the weather, adult consumers should feel free to stay home. Likewise, parents/ caregivers of Murray Ridge School students who have individual concerns regarding the weather should feel free to keep their child at home.

Please be aware that transportation to enclave sites is generally available even if transportation to the Opportunity/Vocational Centers is cancelled. Murray Ridge Center does not broadcast the status of enclave transportation on the television or radio. Consumers should assume that enclave transportation will be available unless they receive a phone call from a member of our Community Employment program.
