A Legacy of Commitment: Jim Uldrich

While he may be known by many for the tasty sauce he prepares for the annual Murray Ridge Support Group Spaghetti Dinner, the commitment **James H. Uldrich** has made to Lorain County citizens with developmental disabilities is derived from a recipe of much stronger ingredients.


"I don't believe in problems. I believe problems are the beginnings of opportunities." -Jim Uldrich

Uldrich first became involved with Murray Ridge Center in 1980 when his then-14-year-old daughter Linda began attending Murray Ridge School. He wanted her to attend the School because he felt she would get an education more suited to her needs and abilities there, than at the public school she had previously attended. According to Uldrich, the transition for Linda was even easier than he thought it would be and she thrived in her new environment. "She was suddenly amongst other children like herself, so she was no longer in a position where she felt she couldn't keep up. That had been very frustrating for her. The difference in her confidence was like night and day" he said.

Happy that his daughter was now receiving the tools she needed to become as independent as possible, Uldrich threw himself into helping the organization that he felt made this possible. He first began volunteering with Linda's Special Olympics Swim Team. "That was a lot of fun. It was great to see those kids have the chance to compete and strive for goals. They felt great about themselves," said Uldrich.

A few years later, he met with the then-titled Par-

ent Support Group (now the Murray Ridge Support Group) to discuss how they might garner more support for people with developmental disabilities from other parents, family members, guardians and the community at large. "It started off as a small dinner and discussion in my daughter's classroom, but ended up as the inception of the annual Spaghetti Dinner," said Uldrich. That was 25 years ago. Maybe it was his famous sauce that made the event so successful, but this modest railroad worker from West Virginia believes it is the compassion and concern of Lorain County citizens for people with developmental disabilities that has made it so successful and long-lasting.

In 1986, he was approached by former Lorain County Commissioner Herbert Jacoby about joining the Board of the Lorain County Board of Mental Retardation and Developmental Disabilities (now the Lorain County Board of Developmental Disabilities). He says he had previously had no aspirations to join the Board, but duty called. He said it was an honor to serve the organization that had done so much for his daughter. By all accounts, his tenure on the Board, as a member, as President and as Vice President, has been successful. Former Board President **Dan White** said "Jim is a wise, honorable, pragmatic man whose only interest is in providing equality

In a time where people across the country are losing jobs and finding it difficult to find employment, Murray Ridge Center adult consumers who also needed jobs had an opportunity to work this summer due to the support and good will of the Lake Erie Crushers.

After months of negotiations and working out the details, the Lake Erie Crushers provided employment for as many as six consumers during each home game, with more than 50 consumers having an opportunity to work over the course of the summer. It took them some time to build their skills, but the management and staff of the Crushers was supportive and patient. The jobs provided by the Crushers allowed these consumers to earn a paycheck, as well as the respect of the team's management.

And this organization's generosity didn't stop with paychecks. When the Crushers made the playoffs, they gave tickets to both staff and consumers to see them play. Later, at our annual golf outing, the Crushers generously donated tickets and autographed baseballs to help with the event.

In their inaugural year, the Crushers chose Murray Ridge to be a part of their organization, they chose to treat our consumers like family, and most of all, they chose to help people. And with that kind of commitment to caring for others, we were pleased to present the Lake Erie Crushers with the 2009 Community Awareness Recognition Education and Service, or C.A.R.E.S. Award. Truly, this is an organization that personifies the Murray ridge motto of *helping people*.

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and opportunities to persons with disabilities." But Uldrich dismisses praise. "I didn't set out to get pats on the back. I just wanted to help with the continued betterment of Murray Ridge as a whole. We can't serve 100% of the needs to 100% of the people 100% of the time, but we have to do the best we can to make decisions that do the most for the greatest number of people," he said. When asked about the challenges or problems he's faced as a Board member, he stoically replies "I don't believe in problems. I believe problems are the beginnings of opportunities."

In his 29 years of involvement with Murray Ridge Center, Uldrich has had his hands in a variety of things dedicated to the betterment of the agency. Maybe it was his humble Depression-era beginnings, his service in the Air Force, or his care and concern for his daughter that formed his sense of compassion and belief in being of service to others. But whatever the motivating "ingredients" are, there is likely no better way to sum up his legacy of commitment than the Boy Scout oath, which he recalls from years of Scout leadership, and recites proudly even today,

"On my honor, I will do my best

To do my duty to God and my Country and to obey the Scout Law;

To help other people at all times;

To keep myself physically strong, mentally awake and morally straight."

Indeed, Jim Uldrich seems to live this oath every day, and no doubt will continue to live it with each tomorrow.

BOARD ROOM BRIEFING

The Lorain County Board of MR/DD convened at 12:30 p.m. on October 23, 2009:

Superintendent Fisher outlined the Board's responsibility involving the annual payment of the non-federal Medicaid costs. To meet this responsibility, a motion requesting that the county auditor certify the availability of \$1,133,273 for use by the agency in calendar year 2010 for Medicaid match was made; the motion was approved unanimously. In other business, Dr. Fisher told the Board that the Murray Ridge Housing Board has just under \$200,000 in funding and that the Housing Board voted to apply those funds toward the construction of a new home. This new home would be a duplex and fully handicapped-accessible. Dr. Fisher also noted that the home would provide a good option for emergency placement for individuals. Finally, the Board also reviewed four resolutions to be presented and voted on at the Ohio Association of County Boards of DD Delegate Assembly in Columbus on December 2—4, 2009. The Board will be represented at this event by President Michele Hunt, who will attend as Assembly Delegate, and Superintendent Fisher, who will attend as Assembly Alternate Delegate.
