Opportunity/Vocational Center New Name for Adult Services Sites

Don't be alarmed when you see a new sign gracing our day service buildings. Murray Ridge has officially changed the names of these sites from Work/Activity Centers to Opportunity/Vocational Centers – a change that has been years in the making.

Going back to 1976 at the original Elyria site, consumers and families would often refer to the Murray Ridge Center adult day service buildings as "the workshops." This trend continued through the addition of the Lorain site in 1986 and the opening of the Oberlin site in 1993. The term was used virtually everywhere by communities who provided services to adult individuals with developmental disabilities.

But everyone knows that daily life involves more than labor; it also involves socialization and personal growth. Over time, our three adult service sites located in Elyria, Lorain, and Oberlin were more frequently referred to as "work/activity centers" to more accurately capture the breadth of services being provided.

In recent years, the adult program has undergone even more consumer-driven structural, technological, and programmatic improvements. The expansion of group and individual activities, learning opportunities, and interactive devices, along with the advent of progressive measures for enabling consumers to experience services reflecting their vocational goals and preferred activities, environments, and interactions, suggested a more encompassing description than "work/activity center." The word that summarizes these changes best is "opportunity." Whether in Elyria, Lorain, or Oberlin, consumers attending an adult service site will find more opportunities than ever before.

More opportunity to dream. More opportunity to learn. More opportunity to live as full a life as possible.

With that being said, it's no wonder that our adult program services sites will now be called Opportunity/

Vocational Centers (OVCs); specifically, the Elyria Opportunity/Vocational Center (Elyria OVC), the Lorain Opportunity/Vocational Center (Lorain OVC), and the Oberlin Opportunity/Vocational Center (Oberlin OVC).

All three sites will continue to offer vocational program training in the development of functional work skills; the Murray Ridge Production Center (MRPC), which operates at each OVC, will continue contracting with local companies to provide a variety of jobs for consumers. MRPC consumer vocational training includes packaging methods, assembling processes, heat sealing, blister packing, collating, labeling, and shipment boxing for local companies.

The OVCs will also continue to offer opportunities for leisure activities such as swimming, bowling, karaoke, arts and crafts, music, games, dances, parties, fashion shows, 'armchair travel,' car and motorcycle shows, and after-hours recreation. Additionally, the sites will provide training in functional academics, computers, cooking, nutrition, self care, and physical and emotional well being.

From workshops to work/activity centers to opportunity/ vocational centers, Murray Ridge strives to ensure that consumers have the tools to live, learn, and laugh in a safe, constructive, respectful, and enjoyable environment.

And while our Murray Ridge adult program sites' names may have changed, you can be certain that our exceptionally caring Murray Ridge adult services staff has not changed at all. They, like everyone who works at Murray Ridge Center, are fully dedicated on a daily basis, to enriching the lives of people with developmental disabilities.

BOARD ROOM BRIEFING

The Lorain County Board of DD convened at 12:30 p.m. on August 26, 2011:

The Board welcomed new Board Member Keith Boey, who has replaced retired Board Member Jane Spiegelberg. An Exceptional Service Award was presented by Board President Michelle Hunt to Transportation Coordinator Jerry York. Director of Vocational Services Jeff Miller recommended that the Board approve identified bus stop locations for the 2011/2012 school year. The Board unanimously agreed. Superintendent Amber Fisher provided an update on the accreditation review by the Ohio Department of Developmental Disabilities; Murray Ridge received a four year certification, the highest for compliance. Superintendent Fisher reported on several developments impacting Board revenues. Per the current state biennium budget, the Tangible Personal Property Tax hold harmless allocation will be cut from 2011-2013 by \$400,000 per year. The Targeted Case Management rate will increase by nearly 66%, generating an estimated \$250,000 a year in additional revenue for the Board. In other business, Superintendent Fisher recommended and the Board approved a revision to the policy on Bonus Time and Sick Leave Conversion Options. Finally, the Board agreed to move the remaining calendar year meetings to the following locations: September meeting at the Meister Road group home, November meeting at Murray Ridge School, and the December meeting at Service and Support Administration building.





Annual Transportation Safety Instruction

Murray Ridge Center wants your ride into our program sites to be a safe one. These are guidelines that both adults and children, and their caregivers should be aware of when utilizing transportation services provided by Murray Ridge Center.

WAITING FOR THE BUS

- Be 5 minutes early. Wait for the bus at least 10 feet from the road.
- Dress properly winter clothing, hats, mittens, and boots will help keep you warm in the winter.
- Watch for the bus' red lights.
- Wait until the bus has stopped and door opens before stepping into the roadway.
- Wait for the driver to signal to cross. Cross at least 10 feet in front of the bus.
- Use the handrail when stepping onto the bus.
- If you use a wheelchair, it must be equipped with a functioning seat belt. The wheels should lock as well.
- Store all belongings in a backpack so nothing gets dropped.

BUS SEAT SAFETY RULES

- Follow all of the driver's instructions.
- Speak softly so the driver will not be distracted. At railroad crossings, be quiet.
- Stay seated until your stop and keep the aisle clear.
- Never put head, arms, or hands out of the window.
- Never do anything to distract the driver.
- Keep aisles clear and free of tripping hazards.
- Never throw things on the bus or out the windows.
- Tell the driver or monitor if you are being bullied.
- If there is an emergency, listen to the driver and follow instructions.
- Do not eat on the bus as this could present a choking hazard.

GETTING OFF THE BUS AT HOME

- If you have to cross the street in front of the bus, walk at least ten feet ahead of the bus along the side of the road, until you can turn around and see the driver.
- Make sure that the driver can see you.
- Wait for the signal from the driver before beginning to cross.
- When the driver signals, walk across the road, keeping an eye out for sudden traffic changes.
- Do not cross the center line of the road until the driver has signaled that it is safe for you to begin walking.
- Stay away from the bus' rear wheels at all times. If you drop something near the bus, leave it. If you leave something on the bus, never return to get it. The driver may not see you come back and start to move the bus. If you drop something near the bus, tell the bus driver before you pick it up so he/she knows where you are.

Many of our consumers are also able to travel about the community through the use of public transportation. We want your trips to be safe ones!

PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION GENERAL SAFETY TIPS

- When you enter or leave a vehicle, watch for slippery or uneven pavement and other hazards that could cause you to fall.
- Have your LCT ID, bus fare, ticket, or pass ready to avoid losing your balance while looking for it.
- Do not carry too many packages always leave a free hand to grab a railing.
- Allow extra time to cross streets, especially in bad weather.
- If it's dark outside, wear light-colored or reflective clothing.
- Do not talk to strangers. If you are being bothered by someone, tell the driver immediately.
- If you use a stop assistance card, remember to show it to the driver as you board the bus.
- Most LCT stops are not sheltered. Dress appropriately for the winter weather, and utilize sunscreen in the summer.
- Whether you are in a bus, car, or van <u>ALWAYS WEAR</u> <u>YOUR SEATBELT IF THE VEHICLE IS EQUIPPED</u> WITH ONE
