

Board member Rebecca Cornman gave an update on the selection of a nominee to receive the Quarterly Exceptional next Award. The board meeting was rescheduled for November 03, 2025. date/time of the next Organizational Meeting was set for January 26, 2026, at 6:30 pm. The Board appointed Member Egbertson as delegate and Superintendent Amber Fisher as alternate to the 2025 delegate assembly of the Ohio Association of County Boards Serving People with Developmental Disabilities. The Board visit to Murray Ridge School, to occur on October 16, 2025, was discussed, as was upcoming Board training on Charting the Life Course, and HCBS Settings and Care Coordination.
