

The 'season of giving' continued into the new year at Murray Ridge Center, as popular You-Tuber and 'Friend of Murray Ridge' Andrew Alvarez donated more than 150 brand new toys for children of all ages. Murray Ridge plans to put these gifts to good use through our Early Intervention (EI) Program for children ages 0-3, Murray Ridge School, Service and Support Administration, and our Family Support Program.

Within our Children's Service Department, we will use the toys for two different purposes. First, we are excited that we will be able to place some of the toys in our Early Intervention Lending Library. This lending library provides no-cost, short term loans of therapy equipment and adaptive toys to families of the infants and toddlers in our EI Program (which in 2025 served 955 local children with developmental delays); this 'library' is important because it enables families of eligible kids to try out development-supporting items before purchasing similar items, and to borrow items that may be needed for only a short time. Additionally, the Murray Ridge Developmental Specialists (whose job it is to work together with families of those in our EI Program to help their children reach developmental milestones) and Murray Ridge School staff will be able to provide age-appropriate toys for families in need to give to their eligible children who become seriously ill, or for a special event (such as a birthday).

Likewise, our Service and Support Administrators (who did service/support planning, linkage and monitoring for 2,245 eligible individuals in 2025) and the Coordinator of our Family Support Program (which in 2025 supported families of 717 eligible children and adults who live in the family home) will be able to access age-appropriate items from the donated supply, to be given to program participants, as needed.

Weather-Related Announcements Reminder

Murray Ridge program closing information will be available on TV station Fox 8, on the Fox 8 website (fox8.com), and on radio stations WOBL 1320 AM and WDLW 1380 AM, as it has been in the past.

There will be two separate listings for Murray Ridge Center:

- Murray Ridge—Adult Activities Centers
- Murray Ridge School

Fox 8 displays information on the status of our School and Adult Activities Centers as described below:

- On fox8.com, the information is listed under the "Closings" tab. These listings are in alphabetical order by the name of the facility, and both facilities appear sequentially in the "M" section as "Murray Ridge School" and "Murray Ridge Adult Activities Centers."
- On TV station Fox 8, information about the status of our School and Adult Activities Centers scrolls from left to right in the Closings information at the very bottom of the television screen. These listings are in alphabetical order by the name of the facility, and both facilities appear sequentially in the "M" section as "Murray Ridge School" and "Murray Ridge—Adult Activities Centers."

NOTE: It appears that Fox 8 no longer has a mechanism for signing up for text alerts on Murray Ridge School/Murray Ridge Adult Activities Centers. If you have signed up for text alerts in the past, we cannot advise you to rely on text alerts this season; please instead access the 'Closings' tab on the Fox 8 website (or one of the radio/television options described above).

Parents and caregivers of school students should disregard the "Murray Ridge—Adult Activities Centers" listing, and follow only the listing for "Murray Ridge School."

Adult consumers who attend our Opportunity and Vocational Centers and their parents/caregivers should disregard the "Murray Ridge School" listing, and follow only the listing for "Murray Ridge—Adult Activities Centers." If "Open - No Transportation" follows the announcement for "Murray Ridge—Adult Activities Centers," parents/caregivers are welcome to transport adult consumers to their day service sites. Regular programming will be provided. Consumers should be dropped off no earlier than 8:30 a.m. and must be picked up by 3:45 p.m.

In the event of bad weather, the decision to transport individuals to Murray Ridge Center will be based on the ability of our buses to travel safely on city and county roads. Regardless of whether or not transportation is available through Murray Ridge Center, if our Opportunity and Vocational Centers are open, but there is an individual concern about the weather, adult consumers should feel free to stay home. Likewise, parents/caregivers of Murray Ridge School students who have individual concerns regarding the weather should feel free to keep their children at home, even if school is in session.

Please be aware that transportation to enclave sites is generally available even if transportation to the Opportunity and Vocational Centers is cancelled. Murray Ridge Center does not broadcast the status of enclave transportation on the television or radio. Consumers should assume that enclave transportation will be available unless they receive a phone call from a member of our Supported Employment Department.

Boardroom Briefing

The Lorain County Board of DD convened at 6:30 p.m. on January 26, 2026. At its annual Organizational Meeting, held immediately prior to the regular meeting of the Board and Ethics Council, Board President Bev Gedid announced the appointment of Robert Gajdos to the Board by Lorain County Probate Judge James T. Walther, and the appointments of Rebecca Cornman and Ryan Egbertson by the Lorain County Board of Commissioners; these appointments are for the term January 26, 2026 to January 25, 2030. President Gedid made committee appointments, and the Board established meeting dates for the remainder of 2026 before adjourning the Organizational Meeting. At its regular meeting, the Board unanimously approved a resolution to provide educational services to children ages 6-21 in the 2026/2027 school year. Director of Educational Services Dann Swift discussed the design of a summer camp for Murray Ridge School students in 2026. Superintendent Fisher and board members discussed site visits for the year.
